Born in Athens c. 484 BCE to a well-to-do family, Euripides was the youngest of the city 's other great tragedy playwrights; Aeschylus and Sophocles. In his youth, Euripides also performed as an actor but as his voice was not strong enough to carry to the back of a typical 14,000-seat Greek theatre, he concentrated on his role as a playwright.
